On behalf of the Old North Dayton Neighborhood, I'm pleased to write this letter to support the Old North Dayton Park Expansion Project at the intersection of Valley and Keowee Streets within the Priority Development and Advocacy Committee process (PDAC.)

The project aims to expand and reimage an important gateway into the Old North Dayton Neighborhood. A master plan vision developed in partnership with stakeholder and resident support and input was created to re-envision the park as a greater asset to neighborhood residents, businesses, and the Dayton community.

Through community fundraising, portions of Phase I have been completed on the site, namely new metal flag banners celebrating the people and cultures of Dayton's International Neighborhood, Old North Dayton. A CDBG funding allocation from the City of Dayton will allow for a large segment of Phase II to be completed 2024. Fundraising still continues to help achieve the vision of a new activated trailhead where visitors can not only access the Mad River and trail network, but also recognizes the area's unique immigrant history and celebrates the neighborhood war veterans.

The park development was made possible in part by the reconstruction of Valley Street from Keowee to Troy Streets which was completed in 2020. This \$1,004,600 road realignment produced new greenspace linking Flood Memorial Park to the Neighborhood War Memorial. Funding will allow for the redesign and construction of this greenspace to create a more usable neighborhood recreational space with better accessibility to the park while continuing to celebrate the history as well as the future of our community.






