RE: Recommendation for funding needed repairs and rehabilitation of the historic site of the Dayton Women's Club

Dear Sir/Madam:

It is my honor and pleasure to submit a letter of endorsement for the grant submission of the Dayton Women's Club building.

This historic building, the grand dame of downtown Dayton, built in the 1840s, exists as one of the few remaining gems of pre-civil war Dayton. It has housed the Dayton Women's Club for a period of over one hundred years. Founded at a time when women were less than welcome in the mens' clubs and boardrooms of the era, the club has had a proud history of accomplishments throughout its existence on the Dayton scene. The women members have literally transformed the physical, economic, and cultural landscape of the greater Dayton area, by helping women improve their skills, thus enabling them to equal the men in moving our community forward through learning to read and write, by promoting literary clubs and public education for all. The club has promoted gender equality and endeavors such as gaining the right to vote for women and largely destroying (or making serious dents and cracks in) the glass ceiling. Founding members of the club read like a "Who's, Who" of significant members of the community. Consider: Marie Kumler, first President of the Dayton Federation of Women's Clubs and first President of the Dayton Women's Club; Electra Dorn, long-time librarian, credited with miraculous work during the 1913 flood in saving many books and priceless collections; Katharine Wright, sister of the Wright Brothers and community contributor in her own right; Julia Patterson Cornell, Co-Founder of the Dayton Branch of the NAACP and founder and financier of the Dayton Art Institute; and Annae Barney Gorman, who saw a need and influenced the creation and development of the forerunner of the Dayton Childrens' Hospital.

The mission today remains that of the founders - - - preserving the best of the past by relating and showing the accomplishments of women's leaders who advanced the quality of life in our community and continue to do so today by guaranteeing a better future for all by training the leaders of tomorrow.

As impressive as is the history of the Dayton Women's Club, the future is even more exciting. The club and its historic structure, for which funding is sought, is envisioned as the future home of the Miami Valley Women's Hall of Fame whose inductees will be, as the name implies, persons who have shaped the greater Dayton area over the last two centuries and more.

The Hall of Fame will showcase the contributions of all women, including the contributions of African American women and those of other minorities, women who were giants in their times and in their communities but who, because of the eras in which they lived and, sadly, even today to a lesser extent, have never been celebrated or acknowledged in the greater Dayton community.

This goal is achievable! Volunteers are numerous and fundraising success is highly probable, if and only if, desperately needed repairs and rehabilitation of this historic building are accomplished.

I have had several tours of this building and can vouch, from firsthand observations, that the structure is at the tipping point. If needed repairs are not made within the very near future, the building may well reach a point where repairs and rehabilitation become, if not impossible, then at the very least far too expensive to realistically undertake. Funding is necessary if the Dayton Women's Club is to survive and achieve the goal of celebrating the historic and present contributions of women, with emphasis, on those of equal accomplishment, but sadly unknown in or forgotten by communities other than their own.

I cannot express my appreciation for your consideration of this funding request.
